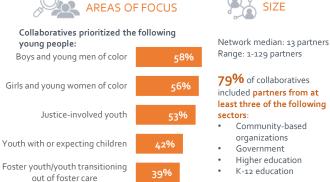

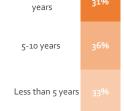
# **COLLABORATIVE CHARACTERISTICS**

# **CORE VALUES**

Equity, youth-led change, and community power building are foundational to OYF. Youth-led change is at its highest level in six years with almost 80 percent of indicators at least somewhat evident across the network. Over three-quarters of collaboratives reported strong evidence in 2024 that collaborative planning included explicit acknowledgement of youth engagement and youth-led change.



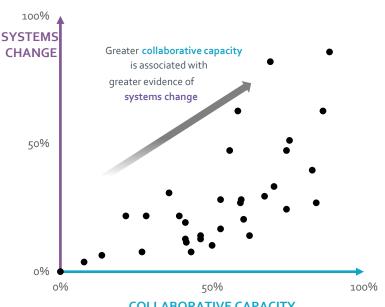
Over the past several years, OYF collaboratives have begun to explore how belonging, meaning, wellbeing, and purpose (BMWP) can help counter the impacts of structurally racist systems for youth. In 2024, at least half of collaboratives:

- Explained BMWP concepts to collaborative members
- Discussed BMWP implementation or strategies with young people
- Supported programmatic improvements to center BMWP

# ORGANIZING FOR SYSTEMS CHANGE

The 2024 evaluation examined two dimensions of communities in the OYF network:

- 1) Collaborative capacity: the infrastructure and processes necessary for the collaborative to carry out its opportunity youth agenda
- 2) Systems changes: "shifts to the conditions that hold a problem in place"\*—in this case, disconnected pathways and inequitable conditions that prevent young people from achieving education and employment outcomes

## **COLLABORATIVE CAPACITY**

Collaborative capacity is at its highest level across the network in six years. One type of capacity – data and learning – is also at its highest level in six years.



% of indicators across the OYF network present within each capacity

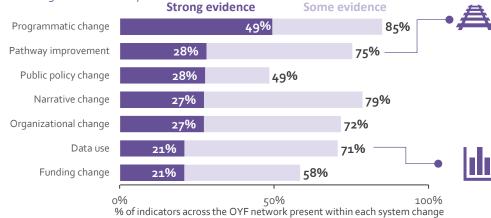
97% of collaboratives included representatives from the sectors and systems necessary to achieve its goals (e.g., higher education, workforce, juvenile justice, foster care).

Resources for the collaborative increased by 10 percentage points from 2019 to 2024.

- 92% of collaboratives reported at least some of their partners formally dedicated personnel to support the collaborative's goals.
- 86% of collaboratives reported at least some of their partner organizations committed inkind supports to the backbone.

# SYSTEMS CHANGES

Systems change (at the "some" evidence level) is at its highest level across the network in six years. Two types of systems change – public policy changes (strong evidence) and pathway improvements (some evidence) – are at their highest levels in six years.



Pathways improvement increased by eight percentage points from 2023 to 2024.

- 91% of collaboratives reported evidence of OY-related systems communicating within each other.
- 73% of collaboratives reported services and organizations from different systems were co-located.

88% of collaboratives reported that partners used data to inform continuous quality improvements within their programs serving OY.

Methods. Findings come from the 2024 OYF Self-Assessment. Thirty-six collaboratives responded to questions about their collaborative capacity and systems changes. The Assessment included indicators grouped into four types of capacities and seven types of systems changes, assessed on a four-point scale.
